
Following Faith March 2022

Friends in Christ,

I am sure your heart has filled with prayers of peace of longing this week, as mine has. I have been praying our Kyrie: Lord, have mercy! Christ have mercy! And I have found myself praying this in my car, as the desert places whiz by my window.

As you may know, in my hospice chaplain work-time apart from Faith Lutheran, I drive a lot. I go to Fernley and Fallon, and Lovelock and Hawthorne. I drive a lot!

Usually it's good. I have time to think and pray, and listen to audiobooks and plan my sermons. And in these hard days of war across the world—the invasion of Ukraine—and innocent people living in fear of what powerful folks might do ... well, I know all our prayers have turned that direction too.



I love the Great Basin and I love the ecotones we live within: from mountain ranges to desert and playa. And in times of both transcendence and in times of need, I find this desert basin setting an appropriate reflection of the posture of my soul.

I find myself saying what Peter says in the gospel story of the transfiguration: "Lord, it is good for us to be here!" And, I wonder if it means I can feel further connected to Jesus of Nazareth? Maybe. He knew the desert.

In fact, Jesus' time in the desert is an important factor in the Church's observance of Lent. We enter a 40-day journey together. 40 being a key number.

Jesus lived in desert dust for 40 days before launching out to heal, and teach, forgive and feed. He was tempted. He fasted, prayed, recited scripture, and claimed God as his loving parent!

For 40 years the Israelites wandered the desert, waiting to enter the promised land. God's people had been made free, but hearts had also turned calloused and hard and forgetful. They needed to turn and see again. They needed rebirth in the desert!



Your church council met Monday evening. We enjoyed pizza and elected officers.



Midweek Worship and Soup Suppers

The season of Lent has arrived and with it our **Wednesday worship services** together. Join us at 4:30pm each Wednesday in Lent.

Lent is a season of repentance, turning to God and asking for God's goodness to wipe away our



sins and shows us how to live anew. Lent also turns us toward Easter and the abundant life God will offer through the Three Days. This **Lenten midweek service turns us toward God's abundance** by focusing on five divine attributes drawn from the gospel texts for Lent (year C): faithfulness, mercy, compassion, forgiveness, and love. Each service is designed for sustained reflection of the gospel in the context of contemplative prayer, readings, silence, and song.

The soup supper that will follow is a wonderful time of fellowship. Lent and Soup go together. Soup that is simple, humble, warm, nourishing. Pastor Ryan Dueck wrote that the Lenten soup supper is a statement of choice. "We choose not to eat as much or the same as we might during other times of the year as a way of remembering that we do not live on bread alone — to acknowledge, even in the context of abundance, that our deepest hunger is for God. For the future God is preparing for us is one of feasting and the celebration of friendship with God and neighbor."

Please join us for Ash Wednesday on March 2nd, and then on March 9th and the following four Wednesdays for times of nourishing our bodies and souls.

March Worship in Lent

Ash Wednesday— We begin our forty-day journey toward Easter with a day of fasting and repentance. Marking our foreheads with dust, we acknowledge that we die and return to the earth. At the same time, the dust traces the life-giving cross indelibly marked on our foreheads at baptism. We pray and yearn. Returning to our baptismal call, we more intentionally bear the fruits of mercy and justice in the world.

March 6 - 1st Sunday in Lent

Each year Lent begins with a synoptic account of the testing of Jesus. Jesus was truly human, suffering from the devil's temptations no less that we, and so he can stand by us when we are tested. We too are accompanied by the Spirit of God when we confront evil. Lent has traditionally been understood as a time to focus on resistance to evil.

March 13 - 2nd Sunday in Lent

Lent is a time for renewal of our baptismal covenant. Each reading gives us a picture of our need—lack of children, lack of a homeland, enemies around—a hungry fox—and each presents us with an image of salvation—descendants, a home, citizenship, protective wings. This is one of the few Sundays in which Christ is compared to a mother.



March 20 - 3rd Sunday in Lent

The readings throughout this season lead the church back to the font of baptism ("come to the waters"; "all were baptized into Moses in the clouds and in the sea") and to the celebration of the resurrection ("come to me... that you may live"). All the readings call upon the faithful to repent of sin and dedicate themselves to productive lives. God is near and will nurture our growth.

<u> March 27 - 4th Sunday in Lent</u>

We are halfway to the feast of the Three Days, but already we share in God's banquet of mercy. We remember our baptismal robes as we celebrate the new creation that God has brought about through Christ. In Lent, even as we are still feeding the pigs and complaining in the fields, we are already in the promised land. Every Sunday, Easter comes out to meet us, like the father running out to welcome his son.

<u>January Food Pantry Report</u>

For January we had four food Pantry Mondays, as we took the Monday after New Year off. We served:

- 167 people from 151 households
- 91 were adults, 44 youth and 32 seniors
- 88 women and 79 men
- We had 39 new people that signed up for our pantry.
- We gave out 9,010 pounds of food. That includes 3000 pounds from Catholic Charites of which 2000 pounds were diet and regular coke.

We are thankful for our 20 volunteers who make this successful every week.

February 2nd is Candlemas, a holiday that is celebrated 40 days after Christmas. It is a blessing time of light, reflecting on when Jesus was brought to be blessed in the temple in Jerusalem and Simeon cried out, "A light to the nations" when he encountered Jesus (Luke 2:32). The Waldorf school has traditionally observed this time, and Pastor Shaun offered to lead them in a blessing time. We joined together on February 4th, with a small liturgy centered around the Blessing of the Candles. Pr. Shaun led the liturgy, and Derek Friend and Grace Tibben-Lembke assisted by providing music.

During the service there was time for the students to present a candle to be blessed for the year, and also to light a candle and offer prayers for themselves or the world or any need. It was very moving. I was very moved by the students and their reverence.

Pr. Shaun asked around for someone to provide refreshments that might reflect/introduce some Lutheran culture. I accepted! I gave us all some background information on cookies and treats provided, and made hot chocolate and provided a Stropwaffel to demonstrate how the Dutch use the gooey cookie. The Dutch put the cookie on top of a cup of steaming tea, coffee or hot chocolate. In the center of the waffle is a sticky caramel, making a tasty treat. I also provided cookies to represent England, Norway, and Scotland. We enjoyed them after the liturgy on the back porch on a cold morning.

The students were so well mannered, I was very impressed!

I feel having the Waldorf School on campus has been an asset for our church family. It was a joy to be a part of their school day.
