Still, just as citizens might have wondered at the birthing of the United States in the 1770's, maybe we are still wondering about some details too.

What will we do? What will this freedom look like?

Well, Paul continues (I'm so, so thankful) and he outlines what kinds of things might grow from this free and faithful life. Spoiler Alert: it is the well-known Fruit of the Spirit in *Gal.* 5:22-23:

"The fruit of the Spirit is love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, generosity, faithfulness, gentleness and self-control."

Freedom = Fruit.

Like a healthy tree, connected to its source and bearing goodness in its living.

So, my invitation to us—within this month of which the fourth day is the celebration of our country's birth—is to contemplate the fruit of our <u>Christian freedom</u>. And let's reflect together! Our Adult Faith Formation class, 11am on Sundays in July and August, will look at Fruits of the Spirit and invite attendees into honest sharing about how we succeed and how we struggle with bearing this fruit in our own lives. We will look at scripture and church tradition and cultural examples too, of how these elements take shape with us.

What does love look? Patience in 2023? Gentleness in our church, neighborhoods and at home? Etc.

Mostly, I am blessed alongside you. We've been given freedoms, political and spiritual, and we've been given an opportunity to bear the fruit in the world. We know our calling together, so let's go. We are free to make our community an overflowing orchard of the fruit of the Spirit.

PRESIDENT'S REPORT

Greetings, Faith!

The council, led by the efforts of Sonja Dresbach, has been collecting bids for repairs of the parking lot and concrete fixtures (the front sidewalk, a handicap ramp, and patio). The congregation will need to decide what improvements or the extent of repairs, and then how we want to pay for those repairs. Along with the payment for the repairs, there is the question of paying off the outstanding debt from the roof repair. The congregation is currently carrying over a hundred thousand dollars in the bank, and about forty thousand dollars on the loan. We will hold a special congregational meeting to decide if we want to pay off the loan outright. The date of the meeting will be announced during the next church service. Also, the Waldorf School will be with the church for at least another two years. Their attempted purchasing of the old Episcopal Church 7th Street, fell through. With their continued presence, we will be looking at potential shared projects for shared land use, like a playground. That's all for now.


